Howdy from the President

T his April was tough! As Aggies around the world prepared for Muster, a handful of Aggies showed the world shining examples of what it means to be part of the Aggie network.

On Monday, April 15th, explosions rocked the Boston Marathon and the Boston Aggies sprang into action. Vicki Green '06, President of the New England Aggie Club, reacted, ensuring that all of the area's Aggies had checked in and were safe. "Most were very close to the explosions, but luckily not at the exact point of the explosions. Thank God!" But the events left their mark, and Kadie '07 and Dan '07 Dooley answered for the Aggies, leaving a 12th Man towel at the memorial. "For Aggies everywhere, the 12th Man towel signifies unity, support, and strength. Symbolically, it seemed all too perfect."

Just two days later, on Wednesday, April 17th, an explosion rocked the West Fertilizer Plant. Within 24 hours, fifteen local businesses, three student organizations, and 200 plus Aggie volunteers delivered approximately 226,500 pounds of supplies and over \$15,000 in cash to the town leaders. One can only imagine the Spirit that arrived in two 53' semis, two 35' trailers, three 15' moving vans, one RV, one moving trailer, and a convoy of personal vehicles.

At the end of an exhausting week, on Sunday, April 21st, 1400 Aggies, families, and friends gathered in Houston to celebrate Aggie Muster and answer the Roll Call. Standing in front of those Aggies, I understood what it means to be an Aggie. "From the outside looking in, you can't understand it. And from the inside looking out, you can't explain it." But we get it. Generosity IS the Spirit of Aggieland.



MUSTER SPEECH



I stand before you tonight not because of who I am, but because of who WE are. We are Aggies, and as such are keepers of a legacy born of tradition and forged in excellence. We stand today as Aggies have since the humble beginnings of this tradition over 100 years ago to honor some of those who have carried that legacy and are no longer with us and to reconnect with those whom soldier on. We do it proudly and with an undying and unparalleled spirit, the Aggie Spirit.

But how do you define the Aggie Spirit? Is it measured by its campus? Aggieland's 5,500 acres are an ever evolving monument to the educational legacy of its professors and students. From world leading research facilities to the recently renovated student center A&M's facilities are among the best in the country and support the pursuits of its students in a variety of interests and endeavors.

Or surely the Aggie Spirit is held by its students. These gifted and exceptional students in some cases carry forth second and third generation legacies that honor a commitment to an institution that has helped nurture them their entire lives. With an enrollment of over 50,000 A&M continues to lead the nation as the school with the highest payback ratio when graduates' incomes are compared to the cost of their education. It stands as one of the top recruitment colleges for public and private organizations adding

talent to their ranks worldwide. As the saying goes there is only one other thing an Aggie will get called after graduation...Boss.

Perhaps its formers students carry the mantle. I say former students because while some may choose to be "Texas Exes" WE are always Aggies. A&M's former student ranks swell with country presidents and politicians, musicians and mothers, firemen and fathers. Aggies have gone on to influence every aspect of the world we live in, making countless contributions and sacrifices in the name of protecting and promoting the ideals we hold most dear.

Maybe A&M's spirit is housed within its military heritage. As one of the leading institutions sending commissioned officers into the armed forces A&M's place in protecting our country and freedoms is undeniable. Our seven Medal of Honor winners stand as a testament to a history of service both in and out of uniform for our ever growing former student rosters. While all who attend Texas A&M learn the importance of service and all those we have lost are worthy of honor, those who make the ultimate sacrifice in service to and defense of our country represent one of the defining characteristics of A&M, its military heritage. I would like to take the time to honor four courageous former students lost in action this past year.

Dario Lorenzetti '92

Dario learned service early on. He would reach the rank of Eagle Scout before attending both A&M and West Point. He would serve our armed forces honorably before moving to the State Department. Dario was lost to us October 13, 2012.

Lt. Col. Roy Tisdale '92

Roy would take the lessons learned at A&M and apply them to a career of service in the Army receiving both the Bronze Star and Purple Heart in addition to a litany of other medals and honors. He was tragically killed June 28, 2012 at Ft. Bragg.

SSGT Jacob Woo '07

While Jacob's time with us was cut short too soon those that knew him said he lived every minute of it. From day one he knew his destiny was to serve which he did during two tours in Iraq. Jacob passed March 2, 2013.



Sgt. Graham Woody '08

Graham believed in the rewards that come with hard work. His love of country and institution were never more present than in a social media post that read in part "I love all my friends. (I am) a Texas Aggie and Texan till I die and living for something greater than myself in the United States Army." Graham left us on April 5, 2013.

We will add our "here" to those that will be voiced for these brave servicemen and lift our thoughts to the families that must go on without them.

On our continued search for the Aggie spirit a stop by Kyle Field, Reed Arena, or any other of A&M's world class athletic facilities cannot be ignored. In a rushing sea of Maroon Aggie Athletics has been a defining part of the Aggie Tradition. Our athletic accolades are many including stunning the world with an attention grabbing entry into the SEC Conference capturing two conference titles defying critics who claimed we would be "outclassed". Oh and did anybody hear we might have the only freshman to ever win the Heisman?

Perhaps the Aggie Spirit is all of these things but for me the Aggie Spirit is different. It cannot be seen in its buildings or accomplishments. It instead is felt and once experienced changes you forever. My time at A&M is filled with wonderful memories but it is also dotted with personal loss. I come from a small family with a mother and father who both dedicated their lives to public service, my father as an Army captain and my mother as a federal agent and investigator. Living a childhood on the go required an all hands on deck mentality and our house was often shared with my grandmother and aunt who would often stand in to raise my brother and I when remote assignments sent my mother and father away.

While she never went to college herself my grandmother fiercely believed in the power of education and cleaned homes to put two girls through college and nursing school before helping them both obtain Master's degrees. An education was never an option; it was a mandate in our household and once in Aggieland I knew the only way out was with a degree. I'd love to say that my arrival to A&M was predestined or born of some



sense of awe or wonderment to the environment and traditions that define it. However, the truth is A&M was not even on my radar as I approached my senior year of high school in Beaumont, Texas.

Having grown up on the move it was by mere coincidence that my high school years were spent in Texas. I was sure my college path led back to the east coast where we had spent several years' time, or to Washington State my birth home. However, life often intervenes. Our family was rocked by loss in the years I was in high school. My aunt who was my mother's only sibling and twin...my cousin whom I grew up with and was like a sister to me...and my grandmother on the night before my senior SAT's were all lost to us. While we all soldiered on it was apparent that we needed to be close.

I thus began to look at schools closer to home and while schools like Yale had courted...I decided on the "Harvard of the South". However, what started as a decision born of tragedy has become a success story. From the moment I stepped on campus I realized I had not only found an education, but a family. Whether it is in College Station or anywhere around the world...and we are EVERYWHERE...no Aggie is a stranger to another.





I thus began to look at schools closer to home and while schools like Yale had courted...I decided on the "Harvard of the South". However, what started as a decision born of tragedy has become a success story. From the moment I stepped on campus I realized I had not only found an education, but a family. Whether it is in College Station or anywhere around the world...and we are EVERYWHERE...no Aggie is a stranger to another.

Those who bear the honor of being Aggies find that no door is closed nor do they find any barrier that cannot be scaled for they often will find an Aggie on the other side ready to assist. While it may not have been my first choice... I now know A&M was the only choice for me.

At no time was it more apparent than in September 2001 after I lost my brother to a brain tumor. The loss devastated me and while I tried to continue my education I ultimately made the decision to withdraw. It was nearing finals time and I was preparing to move myself out of the apartment I had been renting. You can imagine my mindset and the daunting task of moving from Texas to Colorado where my mother had relocated after my freshman year to help bolster a household again scarred by tragedy.

The morning I was to start my move imagine my surprise to find a contingent of fellow Aggies....some friends...some I never met and to this day do not know at my door....boxes and tape...brooms and rags in hand. They helped pack me and clean for the move out inspection. While some of those who helped that day helped a friend, one who had cheered at football games with them, would be the future best man at their wedding, or pulled all night study sessions with them...some helped someone they knew by only one name...an Aggie.

So for me this is the Aggie Spirit. An enduring legacy over 130 years old. A student body filled not only with exceptional talent but concern and support for their fellow man. A spirit held by each one of us, fueled by an undying fire that burns now and forever. For it is in fire, that gold is tested. Thank you.

Rememberance of Cherished Aggies



EDWARD OCDEE 448

Edward Ogdee '43 passed away in September of 2012. He was photographed wearing his Aggie football letterman's jacket, in late 1942, just a few days before he and the members of the entire junior and senior classes at Texas A&M boarded a troop train at College Station, Texas, that took them all off to war in defense of our nation during World War II.

Dad sits second from the right on the top row in this group photo of the 1942 Aggie football team. An interesting side note is that it includes his teammate Bill "Jitterbug" Henderson on the far right of the bottom row, who, as of today, is the only Aggie in the history of Texas A&M University to ever receive a varsity letter for football, basketball, baseball, and track. The other photos I attached are of him in his football uniform circa 1942, and Ed, the W.W.II U.S. Army soldier, with Becky (Mom), his wife of 66+ years.

Austin "Clay" Calhoun '88 received both his undergrad and Masters from A&M, where he also spent two years teaching undergrad courses while working on his degree. Clay was a huge A&M supporter and was responsible for several young adults attending A&M, including Harri Ojala of Finland's daughter. "Clay really introduced me and my family to Texas hospitality, friendliness, and fairness. Clay can truly take credit for the fact that my daughter Katharina is now an Aggie." Katharina graduates this year from A&M, thanks to Clay's support and encouragement.

Clay is buried in a maroon casket in the Aggie Field of Honor in College Station. The pall bearers at his funeral wore white shirts and maroon bracelets with the A&M logo. Those bracelets are buried with Clay. His entire funeral was themed around Texas A&M because he loved it so much.

Clay's son (Austin) is currently attending Blinn in College Station and plans to transfer to A&M next year. He is really struggling with his father's death and wants so very much to walk in his father's shoes, particularly in becoming an Aggie. The walls of this young man's entire room are covered with Aggie memorabilia from my husband's collection.

Finally, when Clay brought me to Texas for the first time, instead of taking me to meet the family, as most people would, he took me on a tour of Texas A&M. A few months later, he brought my son all the way from Kansas to Texas A&M in an effort to convince my son to apply.






