















Love Fosters Hope. Since 2009, **Jose de Leon '06** has worked with Love Fosters Hope and Teen Reach Adventure Camp to provide a safe place for teenagers in the foster care system to grow and thrive at summer camps for teenagers, ages 12-15, in and around Montgomery

> County. Jose also volunteers with Bridge, a camp for teens ages 16-19 who have, or soon will, age out of the foster care system.

"These foster teens arrive at camp nervous, cautious, and with lots of emotional baggage," says Jose, "but leave with smiles, a knowledge that they are cared for and loved, and a renewed sense of hope." It's that hope that drives Love Fosters Hope volunteers to share

their hearts to change the present **Giving a new meaning to "home."** Jose met his wife Melissa at camp, in 2011, when they both volunteered. Often, camp is the only "home" these teens have ever known, and the volunteers who make it possible become their family. The week-long camps strive to provide the "intentional care" that is often missing from a foster kid's daily life. Days are jam-packed with swimming, arts and crafts, outdoor games, talent shows, a challenge course, and eating delicious home-cooked meals. At all times, the kids and their achievements are celebrated. Seven years later, Jose and Melissa are still involved with Love Fosters Hope, attending camps, serving on the camp planning team, and helping with the Run for Hope, and sharing their love and hope with the next generation, their 3-year-old daughter, Eva.

> **Providing more than just the essentials.** LFH even ensures that their kids experience the most iconic teenage rite of passage – PROM! The girls get to shop for dresses, shoes, and jewelry, which they get to take home and keep. The staff helps with hair and makeup. They then take a limo to a fancy dinner where the male volunteers serve the meal. After which, they dance the night away along with camp staff and a DJ!



At the end of 2017. more than 16,000 children had spent their year in Texas's broken foster care system, more than 2,500 of them in the Greater Houston area. 40% of those kids are between the ages of 10-21. But there is hope on the horizon, and Aggies are there to help.




a heartfelt thanks to each of them for their efforts. Your time spent is greatly appreciated, and we thank you.

The Houston A&M Club was honored to share Muster 2018 with guest speaker Gregg Matte '92. Gregg is the senior pastor at Houston's First Baptist Church. Under his leadership, this historic church, founded in 1841, has moved to the cutting edge of ministry and experienced tremendous growth.

Before coming to Houston in 2004, Gregg founded Breakaway Ministries at Texas A&M — the largest college Bible study in the nation. What started with twelve participants in his apartment grew to a weekly gathering of thousands of students each Tuesday night.

Gregg holds a Bachelor's degree in marketing from Texas A&M and a Master's degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary. He is an author of numerous books, the latest being "Unstoppable Gospel." Gregg has received the "Outstanding Alumni Award" from Texas A&M's Mays Business School. He was the first pastor, and youngest person, to receive the honor in the history of the award.

Most importantly to Gregg, he is a husband to Kelly, and together they have a son, Greyson '01 and daughter, Valerie '08.

Varied versions have emerged over the years, but this version is as Dr. Ashton originally wrote it in honor of the Aggie defenders of Corregidor during World War II. * In the third stanza, it was intended that each year, the number of years since the 1942 Corregidor Muster would be inserted.

"The Last Corps Trip" has been recited at Muster every year for as long as most can remember, but its history may not be as well known. Here is the short version:

The poem was written by P.H. "Buddy" DuVal, Jr. '51. It was during the fall semester of his junior year in Aggieland, and the football team was enjoying their first winning season in some time. The next game on the schedule was out of town; thus, the cadets were leaving campus en masse, in the traditional exodus known as Corps Trip.

Back in the classroom, Mr. DuVal's professor noted empty seats, and said something to the effect of: "If you guys were going on a one-way trip to hell, you'd leave a week early." This got Mr. DuVal thinking: "what if they had a different destination?"

From there, the verses came to him one at a time, over time, until one day, he sat down and wrote it out. His "OI' Lady" and other fellow cadets found out about the poem, and they liked it. They recited it at private events and at Dinner with the College President. It was published in The Battalion, and was first read in public at the 1949 Bonfire by Head Yell Leader, Red Duke.

The popularity of this iconic poem has grown over generations, and today, it is literally carved in stone on campus, along the pathway to the Bonfire Memorial.

"The Last Corps Trip"

It was Judgment Day in Aggieland And tenseness filled the air. All knew there was a trip at hand, But not a soul knew where.

Assembled on the Drill Field Was the world-renowned Twelfth Man,

And they've always had the grit. I've seen 'em lose and I've seen 'em win,

But I've never seen 'em quit.

No need to tarry here, Deciding upon their fates; 'Tis plain as the halo on my head That they've opened Heaven's gates."

And when the Twelfth Man heard this.

The let out a mighty yell That echoed clear to Heaven, And shook the gates of Hell.

"And what group is this upon the side,

St. Peter asked his aide, "That swelled as if to burst with pride

When we our judgment made?"




